Marshall County Voters to Elect 2 Iowa House State Representatives in 2026



Both seats are currently held by Republicans, and each has served just one year to date. Each Representative represents about 31,500 people.

Legislative Salaries in 2025 and 2026 are \$35,000 plus a per diem amount of \$201 for every day in Session, up to approximately 100 days. There is also a monthly legislative expense allowance of \$300 per month to cover some expense of office. Newly elected Legislators are provided orientation & training prior to taking office in January 2027.

Iowa House District 52: Former Police Chief Michael Tupper - miketupperforiowahouse.com

District 52 includes all of Marshalltown plus Timber Creek, LeGrand, Jefferson, & Greencastle Townships. The area that predominately makes up District 52 has been held by a Democrat for 38 of the most recent 46 years. The current Republican has been in office just one year as of this publication.

Iowa House District 51: Farmer & MHS High School Teacher Teresa Perin

District 51 includes all of the rest of Marshall County plus most of Rural Story County with the exception of Ames and the Roland-Story City Area. Rural Marshall County has been represented by both Democrats and Republicans over the years.

Marshall County Voters Will Elect Four County Officials in 2026



Voters will elect the following in 2026:

- 2 - County Supervisors to the Board of 3
- County Treasurer
- County Attorney

All County officials in Marshall County are elected **at-large**, meaning, the candidates do not represent an area of the county, but they represent the entire county and all the people. All County Offices are currently held by Republicans but it was not always that way. Democrats held several County positions in 1980s and 1990s, 2000s and 2010s.

In Iowa, County Officials are elected for four-year terms. Current Positions up for election by the voters in 2026 include the following.

We have a three-member **Board of Supervisors** elected at-large. **Two of those seats are up for election in 2026.**

Voters will elect a County Treasurer in 2026.

Legal Qualifications for those positions above are simple. To serve the winning candidate must be a U.S. Citizen, at least 18 years old, a resident of Iowa and Marshall County, and **not** a felon. There are no other formal qualifications.

Voters will also elect a Marshall **County Attorney**. There are formal qualifications to be elected Marshall County Attorney. The candidate must be an attorney admitted to the Iowa Bar to practice in Iowa plus the other qualifications listed above.

The County Attorney is considered a full-time official who prosecutes alleged criminals and advises other local county officials about the legal issues pertaining to their official duties. The Marshall County Attorney salary for 2025 has been approximately \$146,740 plus benefits.

The position of Marshall County Supervisor is considered part-time and the salary is approximately \$47,300 plus benefits.

The Treasurer’s salary is \$81,000. All County Officials and State Legislators in Iowa earn credits in the IPERS retirement benefit program.

Newcomers elected to county offices in November 2026 have the opportunity to receive orientation and training by members of the Iowa Association of Counties prior to taking office in January 2027.

No citizen should be anxious about receiving the adequate orientation and assistance to becoming a newly elected State House Member or County Official. Many resources are offered and available to the election winners.
